Mystic or Infinity Knot

This is one of many symbols for good luck, consisting of 6 Infinity knots tied together and symbolizes never ending luck, prosperity and abundance. They are used to decorate houses or used as gifts or decorations over the New Year.





Lucky Red Envelope (Hongbao)

All Lunar New Year, it's tradition to give a red envelope. These are filled with money and symbolize good wishes and luck for the new year ahead.
